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From the Rector's Study

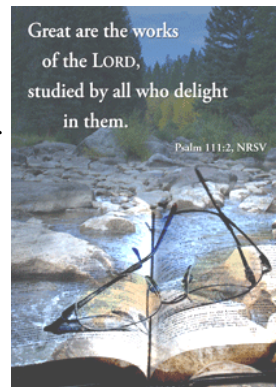

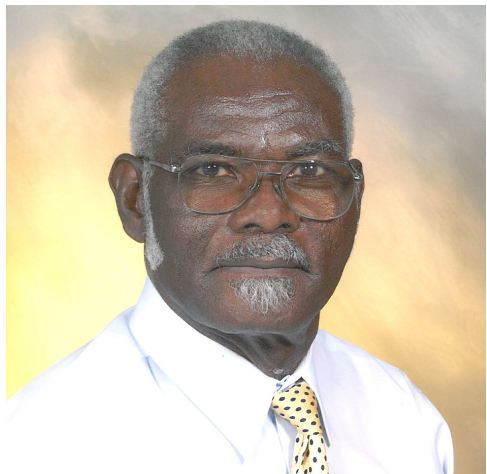

Blessings continue to come. As Spring arrived and our Park plantings were pruned, it appears we did not have so much damage as originally thought. What appeared to be a major project and expense is not so great.

There are a few trees which will have to be replaced and

in another few weeks we will know exactly what has to be done.

By the time you read this, the new flooring will be in the Parish Hall building. It was a project spearheaded by the Mission Cleaners. Thankfully, January and February gave us a slight cushion, so we are \$2,897.00 down so far for the year. If there is a valley, as in March, let us hope that the valley is not so deep that we cannot climb back to one of the peaks. 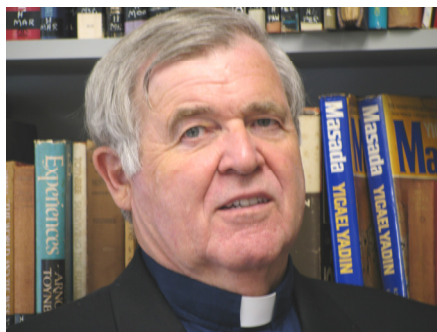

Notes from the choir....

The choir participated in both services on Easter Sunday as well as on Maundy Thursday.

Phillip Eyrich joined us with his trumpet. The trumpet is a great instrument for celebration and with it we celebrated the resurrection of our Lord. The choir worked very hard to learn all the music and we hope everyone enjoyed it as much as we did.

Remember, we are always glad to welcome new members to the choir. All that is needed is a love of singing and the willingness to come regularly to rehearsals on Saturday afternoon for about an hour. We are now preparing for Pentecost.

Many of us remember as young people having the psalms sung during the service. In the churches I went to years ago, the service was usually Morning Prayer and nearly the whole service was sung by the choir because it was mostly psalms. Eucharist was only once a month. This was a custom that began in certain parts of the country when there were not enough priests, and there was a circuit priest who came from time to time, depending on how many churches he served. As with many customs, this became the norm and until well into the 50's it was considered too "High Church" to have the Eucharist weekly, even though by then most churches had their own clergy.

The origin of the musical setting of the psalms that Anglicans use is plainsong which was developed in medieval Europe in the monasteries. After the Reformation, many churches stopped using this form of music, but it continued to be used in the English church. When the first prayer book was printed in the mid-1500's, composers wrote settings for the psalms that were based on plainsong, but not quite the same. This Anglican chant has been used over the last several hundred years on and off, and has been mostly preserved by monastics.

Now, although we have Eucharist every week, we still say a psalm as part of the service. Several people have asked me about the choir singing the psalm. I thought we might experiment with this a little. Of course, not just the choir would sing, but the congregation would follow along. Perhaps it would be nice to try it occasionally, just for a change. So be looking for sung psalms, sometime in the future and enjoy singing along.

THE CHURCHMOUSE ASKS (CHAPTER 4 -part 2) WHAT DO YOU THINK?

Last month we left off with our precious unique human (That's you and me) trying to relate to all those others around him/her and make sense of life's whole bowl of soup. I hope you thought of many other questions with references to the ten commandments. To have order in society we must have standards (laws) which are put in place either (1) by mutual agreement (votes), or (2) are laid down by some other authority or dictated - you have no say or voice or choice or vote - (and departure from either of those is punishable), or (3) there are things accepted as customary (which vary more and are not enforceable by law and not punishable) such as religious observances and historical remembrances. From the beginning of human history there were accepted standards for human conduct. Adam and Eve's sons had a disagreement and Cain killed Abel, and when questioned about it he said, "How should I know where he is? Am I my brother's keeper?" Fast forward some generations and Esau sold his birthright to his brother Jacob for a bowl of stew, and what a mess that turned out to be. The birthright related to inheritance and carried with it both authority and possessions. When humans learned to read and write among their main themes were history and law. Then when God made a covenant with the Jews, which made them the chosen people, they began expanding the laws until there were so many laws that people couldn't even remember them all and couldn't possibly keep them all. So God intervened by sending Jesus. It is overwhelmingly humbling and wonderful to me that God has loved his humans so much that he never gave up on us! He had intervened in Noah's time by wiping out everybody except one chosen family in hopes that his beloved humans would appreciate all he had given them and learn to live in a relationship of love and thankfulness with him and with each other. God called and sent out various people all through history and the lives of all of them are exciting and worth studying and a great inspiration. What those people accomplished in their historical circumstances is amazing.

Certainly Moses is a remarkable example - his life spared as an infant because God needed a leader for his people at

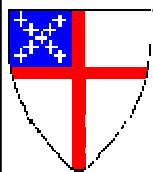
a given time in history. Moses was an adult living a life of luxury and privilege before he even had any idea of the real purpose of his life. But once he understood, he remained faithful and committed in spite of his human weaknesses and faults. So God called him to go to a mountain top where he gave him -"written in stone"- a set of laws which simplify and encompass all the laws people should really need. The "thou shalt" commandments relate to God and come first. Then honor the people who gave you birth and identity. Then come the "thou shalt not" commandments, those that deal with areas that cause problems between humans. I believe that they are stated as "shalt nots" because defining the negative is more precise and easier, while at the same time it allows for a wider range of positive behavior that is creative and individual. And this kind of life is not possible without having a commitment to the source of all that is creative and good, all that is loving and kind, all that comes from a living relationship with the one who created us. God made us good, and only our own choices make us otherwise (other-than-wise). Many people have God's goodness reflected in their lives without realizing or acknowledging its source, and we need to gently encourage and help them in their journey.

So that brings us back to first things first. We stand up and announce this boldly and firmly Sunday after Sunday in the words of the Creed. Our presence at worship and our words spoken declare where our allegiance lies. It does not declare or claim that we are perfect or even good, but it does acknowledge our desire for forgiveness and our hope of living in a loving and creative relationship with our creator and his other humans. One of my favorite sayings (and I don't know who said it first) is "the main thing is to keep the main thing the main thing!". That brings us back to the first four commandments which are the only base and foundation for keeping all the others. The love and peace and grace of our Lord Jesus are ours by birthright, and only we can decide whether to accept or reject this most precious of all gifts. So what do you think (believe)? Where do you stand?

Money Matters

No Place to Leave It – how extended a family?

Many of us don't have an immediate family to whom to leave our estates. We have no children and our siblings are deceased or as old as we are and may or may not have children. We are reluctant to leave our hard earned estates to just anyone or we would like someone close to us to enjoy the benefit of the estate during their lifetimes, but then we don't want our estates going to their distant relatives. What to do??

A trust is an efficient way to handle your estate after you are deceased. It can be used to allow a close friend or needy relative to enjoy the income from your estate without inheriting your estate. After their lifetime your estate can pass to whomever or whatever you wish...another relative or a charity or both. Your trust can live long after you. It can be established so the new beneficiary can have income from the trust (your portfolio), but cannot invade the principal. After that beneficiary dies, the remainder can then pass to another purpose. This way you are increasing the benefits of your portfolio (what's in the trust) without having your estate eventually pass to some distant relative of a current friend of yours.

Might sound complicated, but it is not. You simply have an attorney write a trust for you to meet your wishes, you name someone (the close friend or a younger person or a corporation...like the firm your financial advisor works for) as the successor trustee to you (someone or several people who will outlive all this) and they

manage the estate for the close friend and then distribute or redistribute your portfolio after your friend dies.

This can especially be done for a relative, a grandchild or great-grandchild, with a special needs who cannot afford to inherit money. Leave the money in your trust with a special needs section for that person so they enjoy income from your estate or a portion of your estate and then have those funds going to someone or something else after they (the special needs person) die.

One of the great benefits of this strategy is the ability to help a friend or distant relative after you die AND THEN help a charity of your choosing after that person's death. The benefit of your estate can meet a number of your wishes...for a long time after you are gone!

The attorney who writes your trust does not need to be around for all this time. They simply write the trust and you title your account(s) as the trust with yourself as the trustee. After you someone else becomes the trustee and so on until all your wishes in the trust have been met. A trust can go on for a long time.

Of course, this does require planning AND action on your part. Do not wait forever to do this. It will certainly be too late. Talk to someone you trust about the idea and see an attorney to write a trust document for you. Then visit with your financial advisor, bank, whomever to title your various accounts in the name of your trust. You can help a lot of people by doing this.
